Elevator Speeches: Utilizing for Professional Development



PURPOSE OF ACTIVITY

This activity allows professionals to watch and reflect on a variety of topics (Parent Perspectives, The El Process, Preservice, Resources, Roles, and Strategies) from Elevator Speeches videos.

SPECIFIC STEPS

- 1. Before the meeting:
 - The facilitator can explore and select an Elevator Speech that meets the needs of the audience.
 - Instruct participants to bring a laptop or electronic device or it can be viewed as a group. Choose, email or print copies of the corresponding handout.
- 2. Provide some background information on the topic chosen.
 - **Parent Perspectives** This video series highlights perspectives from the caregiver such as supporting caregivers' emotional state, trusting the El process, and what caregivers wish they knew.
 - **The El Process** This video series showcases examples explaining different components of the early intervention process such as child outcome summary (COS), transition, eligibility, and referral.
 - **Preservice** This video series highlights the benefits of collaboration between local systems and higher education.
 - **Resources** This video series focuses on potential resources for early interventionists such as CDC ACT Early Campaign, Center for Family Involvement, and New Path.
 - Roles This video series shares the various different roles in early intervention.
 - **Strategies** In this video series, early interventionists share some of their favorite strategies to support families.
- 3. Play the video(s) chosen.









- 4. Provide participants the handout corresponding with the topic chosen. Break participants up into small groups of 3-5 and instruct them to take 10 minutes to reflect and answer the questions.
- 5. Once the time is done, reflect with the large group to discuss their answers using the facilitator handout to guide the discussion.
